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**Modernizing the Assistive Technology Act**

**WASHINGTON, DC** – The Association of Assistive Technology Act Programs (ATAP) strongly supports S. XXX, *the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Assistive Technology Act*, introduced by United States Senators Bob Casey (D-PA), Maggie Hassan (D-NH), Susan Collins (R-ME) and Kevin Cramer (R-ND). This bill would modernize and update the current law authorizing State Assistive Technology Act Programs and Protection and Advocacy Systems related to assistive technology. Given the strong and effective changes made during the 2004 reauthorization, this reauthorization refines and strengthens the components solidified in 2004, and refrains from significant changes or inclusion of additional programs. This approach to reauthorizing the Assistive Technology Act Programs is strongly supported by Assistive Technology State Grantees.

In response to the release of the *21<sup>st</sup> Century Assistive Technology Act*, Audrey Busch, Executive Director of the Association of Assistive Technology Act Programs (ATAP) stated:
